## Clay County Set to Begin Reconstruction of Bridge s

Reconstruction of a 90-foot bridge that will span the Fishing river at Mosby was started early this week, Edward J. Wnuk, Clay County presiding judge, said last night.

The bridge originally was used at 103rd street and State Line. Whuk said the county purchased the structure and is reconstructing it at a cost of

\$54,000. He

He said the construction company dismantled and transported the structure to Mosby during the summer. The delay in re-erecting it was caused by difficulty in obtaining right of way at the site, Wnuk added.

Wnuk said the firm would sandblast the bridge and give

it a new coat of paint and a 7inch layer of concrete flooring and finishing.

"It was definitely a bargain," the judge said. "Several years ago the court was offered a 60-foot bridge for \$84,-000 by another company."

He said the used bridge is replacing one that was washed
