3. Description

The Keeseville Historic District consists of 142 structures concentrated on the streets east and west of the Ausable River, which bisects the village. The historic commercial focus of the district is Main Street and Front Street. Residential areas of the district extend several blocks east, west and south of the massive stone arch bridge which links both halves of Keeseville. Buildings encompassed by the boundaries generally consist of two-story frame, brick or stone residential, industrial, civic, commercial, and ecclesiastical structures built between 1820 and 1936. Only eleven buildings do not contribute to the significance of the historic district. Six of these modern, non-contributing buildings are concentrated in the commercial block bounded by Main, Front and Clinton Streets, where they occupy the site of commercial structures destroyed by a series of fires near the village center. In order to encompass surrounding residential streets whose integrity has not been affected by the fires, the district boundaries are drawn for cohesion, thereby avoiding the gap which would otherwise occur if the block were excluded. Boundaries of the district are those delineated on the enclosed large-scale map. An annotated list of buildings included in the historic district follows.

4. Significance

The Keeseville Historic District encompasses structures reflecting the development of a significant center of Adirondack regional commerce and industry during the nineteenth century. The district contains significant, well-preserved examples of industrial and commercial buildings, working-class houses, stylish entrepreneurs' residences, and two historic bridges spanning the Ausable River. Keeseville's rich architectural heritage within the district includes distinctive regional examples of Classical, Gothic Revival, and Italianate design (many designed and built by noted local craftsmen/housewrights Seneca and Isaac Perry), as well as significant vernacular structures, many built of local river sandstone. In its historic setting and in the quality and variety of its historic structures, the Keeseville Historic District typifies the Adirondack water-powered mill community of the period 1820-1890.
